

Rector's Letter

The Rev. Robert E. Baldwin, Rector

For most of 2024, we heard from the Gospel of Mark on Sunday mornings. The Gospel of Mark is the first, and shortest of the Gospels, but one of the quirkier traits that the Gospel has is that it uses the word "immediately" constantly throughout the text. "Immediately" occurs forty-one times in the Gospel; by comparison, the entirety of the New Testament only uses the word ten times elsewhere.

This gives the briefest of the Gospels an even greater sense of urgency, of immediacy to Jesus' ministry and the coming of the Day of the Lord. This past year has had that similar sense of energy and activity.

Last year, I mentioned four areas (four-and-a-half) I wished to see Trinity go in terms of ministry. The first was ministry to the elderly, specifically building up our online ministry for those who cannot attend. The second was to increase ministries given to young people and their families. The third was to intentionally focus on maintaining the physical plant. And the fourth was evangelism. The "half" was about being environmentally sensitive at a church.

Our online ministry team continues to develop that ministry to promote engagement with our participants. We instituted family-friendly events like game nights, the Advent Fun Day, and children's sermons. The property committee has been working extensively to both respond to and anticipate upcoming property issues, and in 2025 we will be hiring a part-time sexton to give them staff support. And a powerhouse team of volunteers has created a vital newcomer team that makes sure that every visitor is identified, welcomed, and connected with me and other members.

In addition, Sarah Doyle's retirement provided the impetus for us to reconfigure the office staff situation. We hired Kirstin O'Connor as a bookkeeping contractor for the parish and the Trinity Day School and we hired Deneise Murad as parish administrator. Their contributions have been so meaningful to the parish that we will be expanding Deneise's hours next year. The increased office staff also catalyzed a discussion about space usage

in the building that has grown from a simple matter of moving things around to a widespread conversation between staff, the Vestry, and parish leaders about long-term goals and strategic planning.

So, what does 2025 look like, in addition to increased staff support and a widespread overhaul of room usage in the church? One growing edge of Trinity's ministries that has been active in the past and will be yet again is providing more opportunities for spiritual growth and development, including retreats and programs. We are looking into expanding youth ministry, including joint events with other local parishes. And as always, we want to continue to make our existing programs and new events as newcomer- and family-friendly as possible.

Thank you for everything you personally do for this parish to make it the wonderful community of Christ that it is.

Our Parish Administrator, Deneise Murad, has been instrumental in getting us important data and working in connection with Kirstin. I feel there is a bright future that God has made for us, and I am excited to a part of this charge.

The Church Office experienced several major changes in 2024. Office Administrator, Sarah Doyle retired in June and Deneise Murad came on board as our Parish Administrator. Gary Wilmore stepped down as the volunteer bookkeeper and Kirsten O'Connor was contracted to do the bookkeeping for both the Church and the Day School. Laura Huestis remains a valuable part of our office team with her weekly work on putting together the church bulletins and uploading information to the website.

Regular office hours were re-established when Deneise started. Beginning in June of 2024, the church office hours were M-F, 9am-1pm with Deneise working Monday – Thursday and Laura working Friday. In 2025, these office hours will be expanding.

Since the Rectory has been converted to a home, the office has been temporarily located in the Prue Day Library with storage and copier space located in the Chapel sacristy. The Space Use Taskforce has met and is addressing where the office will be located permanently. This solution is slated to take place in 2025.

Many thanks to our office volunteers:

Karen Dewar, who shows up weekly to manage all of the name tags for Sunday services and is willing to offer support in any way needed. She has been scanning files, stuffing envelopes, etc. Gary Wilmore, who shows up daily to deliver our mail from the post office. He also signs and mails checks weekly. Jon Hayward, who technically is on the Communications team, but is there to answer all the questions Deneise has about internet, website, etc. He has been a steady support in the office transition.

As a new staff with a few active volunteers, we have begun to find a nice rhythm. The office staff welcomes any members who would like to volunteer!

Music Ministry

Tim Harrell, Choirmaster / Organist

Music is a fundamental ministry at Trinity. Led by Tim Harrell, our organist/choir director, the choir supports the congregation in service music and hymn singing at Sunday services. The ministry also provides liturgical musical support for the congregation in the special services of Christmas Eve and Easter Vigil. Tim also provides organ accompaniment at the many weddings celebrated at Trinity.

The all-volunteer Senior Choir consists of approximately 25 singers and sings at all 9:30am Sunday services. The St. Cecilia Children's Choir, now in a rebuilding stage under Assistant Director Anne Shields, provides occasional offertory anthems and Communion music, also at the 9:30am Sunday service.

Friends of Music

Musical events outside of church services are organized under Trinity Friends of Music (FOM), a program which is wholly supported by donations from parishioners and interested community members. In addition to the always-sold-out Christmas Messiah concert, the FOM concert series this year will feature return performances by opera and recital singers Michelle Johnson and Brian Major, and the Hofstra University Chamber Choir, violinist Abbie Ringdahl, as well as organ recitals by Aaron Patterson and our own Timothy Harrell. A number of outside groups use Trinity as a concert venue on a regular basis, including the La Fiocco renaissance ensemble, Concordia chamber players, Cantus Novus chorus, and the men's a cappella group Cordus Mundi. Use of our space by such outside groups has now been formalized and is administered by the Church Office using the new Facilities Use Agreement form.

Organ

The Martin Pasi mechanical-action organ is the foundation of Trinity's music program. Now almost 20 years old, it is scheduled for a modest structural upgrade by Martin himself in the near future. This upgrade will preserve the integrity of the organ for many years to come. The cost of this work will be covered by a dedicated fund which was established from the original organ campaign at the time of the organ's installation in 2006.

Piano

The generosity of a number of donors in the Parish and of the original owner have allowed us to acquire a magnificent Steinway Grand piano for the Sanctuary. Under the auspices of Friends of Music, an inaugural recital concert took place on November 10, 2024. Trinity pianists Tim Harrell, Susan Johnson, Lisa Landley, Matt Mackensen, Virginia Sheay,


James Wells and Christopher Whitney all superbly demonstrated the qualities of this fine instrument.

Trinity Day School

The 2023-24 school year ended in mid-June with a roster of 43 students. We graduated 20 students on to Kindergarten. This year, we have a current roster of 45 students, 23 of whom are PreK students. Two of these PreK students returned for a growth year. We expect almost all to graduate on to Kindergarten this June. We added 6 students to a new Toddler Grow/ Young 3's class in January.

We currently employ 6 teachers, 5 aides, and 1 director. Prior to the start of this school year, we increased pay by \$1/hr. for all classroom staff. We are looking to increase tuition for the coming school year to allow flexible funding for potential further increases.

TDS Parents Committee and families committed to sponsoring two children's holiday wish-lists this December. We will also be supporting Mrs. Killough's mission trip to Guatemala in late January. Last spring, and again this March we'll sponsor an activity table at the St. Baldrick's Community Event raising money for pediatric cancer research. This spring we will, once again, sponsor the tee-ball teams of the Solebury Township Little League.

Our in-school enrichment programs began in September with yoga. Miss Adi (The Yoga Gnome) and Miss Kate led us in relaxing poses and got our bodies moving in new ways leading up to the Thanksgiving holiday. We welcome back our dynamic music teacher, Mr. Righteous Jolly, this January through March. Yoga will return when we come back from Spring Break.

Our PM Enrichment programs began in September with a new addition: Afternoon Scholars (for the oldest of our PreK students), meeting 3 times each week. Forest Fridays also started in late September and we enjoyed Holidays & Baking program on Tuesday & Wednesday afternoons after our return from Thanksgiving. Upcoming afternoon enrichments include subjects like: Game Masters (playing cooperatively), Super Sleuths, Young Authors, Winter Crafts, Science, Cooking, and more. Our afternoons are always filled with child-led play, assisted by gentle prompts and redirection from staff. We have a robust list of students who stay each day.

Registration is underway for next school year, and camp registration for June will begin in February. We are anticipating another full student roster for the 2024-25 school year.

We know that facilitating worship and the Eucharist for Trinity is a privilege, a responsibility, a time for some fellowship and grace, not a mere duty. And we often have fun! After service you may see folks going into the sacristy to help each other wash and put away the service vessels, talk and laugh.

We have set for all worship and special services including two with the bishop, the Rt. Reverend Daniel G.P. Gutiérrez. Sydney Fox created a lovely children's cross for the sanctuary; Laura Huestis, made a veil for cremains; a new set of white paraments was purchased; we worked with Bill Wolf and Deborah Faust to have the Vestry approve the altar repair; and with Vestry support, we replaced the wine ewer with a sterling one which will not corrode. We met for a "polishing party" with Lorri Perkins; moved and stowed

crates of stoles and chasubles; considered some general reviews and adjusted some procedures; worked to replace the candles with oil candles which will ameliorate future damage to the needlepoint and fair linen and set out the Trinity creche in MacArthur Hall.

In the chapel, we changed the paraments when possible, set the Advent wreath and set for several services at Rev. Rob's request.

Going forward, we suggest work on the chapel altar, so that centering prayer has a decent place for their materials, safe storage for the moveable altar top, and our priest a safe place to officiate. This is not major- a platform base! It also would be very helpful if the lock on the cabinet in the sacristy could be replaced. The Diocese has been alerted that Rev. Rob would like a tabernacle (from a closed church) for the sacristy, for the reserved sacrament.

Altar Guild may seem a "behind-the-scenes" ministry, but we are a vibrant, busy group: join us!

The year 2024 brought us two new members, Whitney Chandor and Kevin Clark

and we now are a committee of seven.

The following projects were accomplished and/or are in progress:

- A Children's Cross was crafted by Sydney Fox for use during Rev. Rob's children's sermons.
- Many of the books from the library were moved to the ante room by the stairway in the narthex; creating a mini library.
- The coat alcoves in the Narthex hallway were cleared of clutter and are now available
 - for hats and coats.
- It was determined that the Mira Nakashima Altar needed some repairs and refinishing. That was done in their workshop by one of the original craftsman and it looks beautiful. The Church purchased a specific dolly which is to be used by a dedicated Trinity team when moving the Altar.

Communications Ministry

2024 was both an easy and a challenging year. The weekly production of notices, updates to the website, and posts to Instagram and Facebook flowed easily throughout the year with the help of Roger Stikeleather, Marilyn Schuster, and Laura Huestis. It is noteworthy that on our weekly notices email, the average "open rate" (percent of emails sent that are viewed by someone) is 22% above the industry average open rate.

As nice as that is, several technical challenges occurred. There was a mandatory update to our hosting platform that meant we had to review a large percentage of our web programming. Then there was a mandatory update of our phone system that required switching hosting platforms. Fortunately, that upgrade went easily despite a lot of angst.

Then, as September approached, we had 3 concurrent and vexing issues: noise in the church audio system, an internal internet outage, and poor broadcast quality.

Thanks to Ed Phinney sacrificing his day off, we were able to isolate and correct the internal internet issue. I don't know what I would have done without his help.

Regarding the audio noise issue, eventually, we were able to isolate it after trying at least 6 different filters and adapters.

Then there was stuttering in the video broadcast. This issue occurred as we switched to using graphic overlays during the broadcast (more about that below). It took a several weeks to tame this issue, as we could find nothing wrong with the hardware/software setup. Eventually, we opted to switch to a new hardware encoder, and all was fixed.

However, the audio system still proved problematic with many complaints about general audibility. Then God sent us a solution: our own member, Chris Peters, stepped up to help. Chris installs systems like ours as a part of his career. He quickly said we need to buy and install a certain audio mixer. We did that, and eliminated at least 6 pieces of

equipment whose functions were now rolled into one. But the most amazing part is how Chris then fine tuned our system microphone by microphone, and then went on to fine tune the frequency response of the whole room using white noise.

I also want to acknowledge and thank Mandy Baldwin for her upgrades and contributions to our weekly video broadcast. Mandy takes each week's service and breaks it down into 30 or more separate graphic slides that she then overlays on the broadcast throughout the service while simultaneously switching between two cameras and changing the camera views. This is a big job, and it takes a lot of background work and dexterity to keep all flowing smoothly.

Finally, thanks again to Ed Phinney, who, while simultaneously participating in the choir, has faithfully "driven the video camera" during our live broadcasts until we started using the graphic overlays in August.

If you have any ideas, complaints, suggestions, we are always open to any feedback. It's our joy to help spread the word of all the wonderful things God does, and all the wonderful things happening at Trinity.

¹ Other revenue is a combination of several categories, and includes Church rent, wedding revenue, flower revenue and restricted and unrestricted gifts.

² Buildings/Equipment includes the cost of replacing the air conditioning system in the rectory.

³ Other expenses is a combination of several categories, and includes communications, spiritual life, worship, youth and miscellaneous expenses. Other expense includes a \$25,000 transfer to the Capital Maintenance Reserve on Trinity's balance sheet.

2024 Year in Review

2024 was a good year for Trinity financially. At this time last year there was a great deal of enthusiasm. We had a new rector, in person services were restored and attendance was steadily increasing. The rectory renovation had gone exceedingly well, and 2024 pledges were up by close to \$100,000 from 2023. Unknowns included whether the Church office could run efficiently in the former library in McArthur Hall, and the length of time it would take to assemble a staff to support a growing congregation.

As is our custom, expenses were budgeted at levels representing best estimates of what was likely to occur during the year. A balanced budget was projected.

Actual results were significantly different. Total 2024 revenues came in much higher than anticipated. Every category of revenue exceeded our budget. New members continued to pledge throughout the year, so total Pledge revenues were up. Plate revenue almost tripled the amount budgeted, as we overestimated how much the increase in pledges in 2024 would affect Plate revenue. Fundraising revenue was also up, as Lobsterfest, Cookie Bake and St. Nick's Fair were successful. Other revenue exceeded expectations as we received both restricted and unrestricted gifts, as well as significantly higher wedding income and Church rent. Restricted gifts, which are designated for a specific purpose, included contributions to the Kensington project, the ECS Episcopal Community Services project to help people set up homes as they transition from homelessness, and contributions to the Day School teacher's mission trip. We also received a gift to our endowment fund from a member who died during the year. Unrestricted gifts primarily consisted of memorial gifts.

Total expenses were also substantially higher than budget in 2024 with each category exceeding out budget. The most significant increases were in Building/Equipment, which includes approximately \$38,400 relating to replacing the air conditioning system in the rectory, as well as unanticipated repairs during the year. Maintenance expenses increased largely because of higher than usual expenses for work done in 2023 that

weren't billed until 2024, as well as the purchase of the dishwashers in the kitchen. Also, we incurred snow removal expenses of approximately \$9,500 compared with none in 2023. Personnel expense increased primarily due to the excellent addition of Deneise Murad, Parish Administrator, on a part-time basis, and Kirstin OConnor, Bookkeeper, on a contract basis. Office expense increased primarily due to unanticipated costs incurred in connection with the office relocation. Other expense includes a \$25,000 transfer to the Capital Maintenance Reserve on our balance sheet.

As a result of the above, particularly Lobsterfest's success, we were able to meet our commitment to the Diocese and to continue providing outreach support, not only to Mission Philadelphia, but to the four local organizations we have supported for some time: A Woman's Place, the Bucks County Opportunity Council, the Delaware Valley Food Pantry and Fisherman's Mark.

2025 Financial Plan

Looking forward to 2025, projected pledge revenue is \$445,000. Pledge participation is based on the receipt of 105 pledge card responses. Lobsterfest, Cookie Bake and the St. Nick's are expected to continue in 2025, providing additional revenue to fulfill Trinity's mission.

On the expense side, we have budgeted conservatively to reflect known events, but we are projecting a deficit. The largest expense increase, in Personnel expense, includes additional hours for our Parish Administrator, the hiring of a full-time sexton that will cost slightly more than our current cleaning service, and salary increases for staff. There are two ongoing projects that are not included in the 2025 budget. A task force is currently reviewing alternatives for relocating the Church office, and the property committee is reviewing long-term repairs to the heating system. Since the timing and potential expense of these projects is unknown, we thought it was premature to include costs for these projects in the budget at this time. We are confident that Trinity has the resources to

accomplish these projects, as well as other unanticipated expenses that might arise through the year.

Foyers Groups

Over the past few years, the Trinity church community has organized into groups of eight to ten, singles or partnered, for quarterly meal get-togethers. There is no agenda for the gatherings other than enjoying the company of others in our Trinity community and learning more about the amazing folks who make up our congregation. The host couple supplies the main course and beverages, while the rest of the group brings appetizers, salads, side dishes and desserts. Optionally, the host couple can organize a meal (Dutch Treat) at a local restaurant. The groups are set at the end of each calendar year for the following year. Greeters Ministry

Greeters are the first impression visitors and newcomers have of Trinity. Greeters arrive between 9:00 am and 9:15 am to stand in the Narthex and direct parishioners to the name tag books. Greeters help any newcomers or worshipers without a name tag complete a blank name tag and sign up on the missing/new name tag sheet. Thanks to office volunteer, Karen Dewar, printed name tags usually appear in the name tag binders by the next Sunday. At the close of the 9:30 am service, Greeters leave the Sanctuary during announcements and stand in the Narthex to greet everyone, especially the newcomers and visitors. Newcomers and visitors are encouraged to complete a blue WELCOME card then introduced to Rev. Rob. Currently we have about 30 greeters, scheduled 3-4 times a

year in pairs. We are always looking for more friendly people, so if you'd like to join the Greeters Ministry, please contact Cathy Mumford at mums@juno.com or (908) 385-5455.

Knitting Ministry

Mission Philadelphia

Mission Philadelphia (MP) is a youth led multi-day, residential, service initiative, in North and West Philadelphia. The primary focus is urban greening and agriculture. Strong partnerships have been developed with North Philly Peace Park (NPPP) and West Philly Peace Park (WPPP), both grass roots, community-based nonprofits. MP also celebrates a renewed alliance with Episcopal Community Services (ECS). Additionally, we celebrate that youth and adults from St. David's, Radnor have now joined this important ministry.

Mission Philadelphia has continued each year, even in Summer 2020. 2024 projects included construction of a tall fence, shed repair, and gardening at West Philly Peace Park, restoration of an orchard and large-scale garden elsewhere in West Philadelphia, installation of a greenhouse, assistance with the food pantry and other needs at ECS's St. Barnabas Community Resource Center, and general clean up, painting, and gardening at North Philly Peace Park.

The team enjoyed residing at Bryn Mawr College. Some meals were eaten in the cafeteria, and others were provided by St. David's members. In the evenings, youth enjoyed time together over swimming, basketball, ping pong, card games, and an ice cream run.

Mission Philadelphia could not be possible without the funds raised through **Trinity's annual Lobsterfest.** We are deeply grateful for the parish and community's support of this wonderful event. Mission Philadelphia 2025 is scheduled for Tuesday, June 17 – Sunday, July 22.

Mission Philadelphia's mission has a profound impact, both among Trinity and community members who help in its planning and execution, and those who benefit in the broader communities. It has been an important way to help transform abandoned spaces, break

down racial barriers, and deepen understanding among and between communities.


